## Distinguish Differences Between Farm Tasks and Play, To Ensure Children Are Always Out of Harm's Way!

National Farm Safety and Health Week (NFSHW), promotes a 75-year tradition of educating and celebrating safety's relevance in our agricultural industry. Each Wednesday during NFSHW, the International Society for Agricultural Safety and Health, along with the National Education Center for Agricultural Safety, focuses on ensuring the safety and health of children living on farms, ranches and in rural areas.





Growing up on a farm can be a wonderful experience. From a young age, children gain a strong appreciation for agriculture, learn the value of hard work and develop into the future generations of farmers and ranchers. However, sobering statistics reveal that every three days a child dies and every day 33 children are injured due to agriculturalrelated incidents in the United States, according to the National Children's Center for Rural and Agricultural Health and Safety. To ensure our children develop into our future agriculture leaders, we need to keep them safe and healthy. Cultivating the Seeds of Safety starts with having the right tools in place and the most important tool is education. Let's plant the seeds of safety early on with these important tips:

- ✓ Foster a child's curiosity of agriculture in a positive way. During hectic times of year, from spring planting to fall harvest, be mindful of children's curiosity around large farm equipment, chemicals, animals and grain. Remind children that the farm is a livelihood and not a play area; therefore, it should be treated with the same respect and care as any other workplace.



✓ Children are great imitators, so give them something great to imitate. As adults, we must continuously role model safe behavior during day-to-day farming practices from handling chemicals to working around large equipment and animals.

- Ensure tasks given to youth align with their development skill level. All tasks and chores assigned to youth should be age-appropriate and align with the child's development skill level. The Agricultural Youth Work Guidelines is a great tool designed to assist parents and supervisors in assigning appropriate tasks for youth who live or work on farms and ranches.
- ✓ Attend a Progressive Agriculture Safety Day®. Safety Days are designed to be one-day, age-appropriate, hands-on, fun and safe events for children in rural communities.
