Ouring a Progressive Agriculture Safety Day in Minnesota, participants learn why certain farm tasks are more appropriate for older teens and adults because of both their size and developmental ability. They also learn about blind spots and that although they can see the operator, the operator may not always see them.

A farm is a wonderful place to grow up. However, it can be a dangerous place for young children, especially during harvest. Lead by example and instill the importance of practicing safety all the time. Here are five safety tips to keep in mind:

1. Always walk around your equipment before starting it, as children may be hiding or not visible in blind spots. Doing this walkabout can also alert you to any other potential safety issues.

2. Never allow kids to climb and play on or near farm equipment, even when it is not in use.

3. Always lock up equipment and machinery when you finish using it. Remove the keys, and keep them out of reach of children. Also, for equipment that may fall, such as buckets, make sure they are placed in the down position.

4. Do not allow children to be passengers on tractors, lawn mowers or other farm equipment.

5. Designate and create a "safe play area" with protected boundaries like a fence that is far away from where machinery is operated or stored.
